This is the second semester of a year long course treats the fundamentals of the theory of functions, including complex integration, Cauchy integral formula, singularities and the argument principle, maximum modulus, convergence in spaces of holomorphic function, Runge's Theorem, Schwarz reflection, harmonic functions, entire functions and the Picard theorems.
