Grading Each homework assignment is worth 5% and each quiz is worth 15% of the course

The final grades will be curved, but will be no tougher than the 10-point scale: 90%-100% will be some form of A, 80-90% will be at least some form of B, etc. After the third quiz, you will receive a projected grade based on your work to date.
