# **1. INTRODUCTION**

1a <u>COURSE CONTENT</u>: MAS3114 is a 3-credit course on linear algebra whose topics are of computational nature. The topics include linear equations, linear transformations, matrices, determinants, vector spaces, eigenvalues, and inner products. This course emphasizes computational aspects of Linear Algebra. MAS3114 is designed to serve science, computer science, quantitative science, engineering majors, and mathematics minors. Mathematics majors are required to take MAS4105, Linear Algebra 1.

**Learning Objectives/Outcomes:** Upon successful completion of the course, students will:

- Solve linear systems of equations explicitly and numerically.
- Demonstrate understanding of linear transformations and their importance to applied science.
- Perform basic matrix calculations and compute determinants of matrices.
- Explain basic linear algebra concepts including vector space, subspace, span, linear independence, basis, and dimension.
- Diagonalize a matrix when applicable.
- Demonstrate understanding of inner products and orthogonality.
- Determine least-squares solution of linear system.
- **1b** <u>**PREREQUISITES:**</u> MAC2312 with a minimum grade of C and experience with a scientific programming language.

#### 1c REREQUIRED MATERIALS:

#### Textbook: Linear Algebra and Its Applications, 6th edition, by David C. Lay

An access code to **MyLab and Mastering** is required for the course. It can be obtained through UF All Access program by authorizing charges to your student financial account and is provided at a reduced price. This option will become available starting one week prior to the beginning of the semester and ends three weeks after the first day of class. If a student does not wish to authorize charges to his student financial account, he may purchase an access code at the UF bookstore instead, which will be more expensive than opting-in.

#### 1d <u>E-LEARNING CANVAS</u>: All course-related information is posted on Canvas. Students are required to complete the **Orientation Module** and **Course Orientation Quiz** to unlock the remaining Canvas pages and start Unit 1.

**Turn on Notifications** in your Canvas account so that you can receive timely alerts in your UF email. See the instructions for Canvas Notification settings.

**Check Canvas Announcements.** Due to the volume of email instructors receive, we cannot reply to each request for the information that is already posted online.

- 1e <u>LECTURES</u>: The lecture videos provide the main presentation of course material. To keep up with the course, we recommend watching the videos daily by following the schedule posted on the course calendar. The course material is divided into three units:
  - Unit 1: Lessons 1 9 Linear Systems & Matrices
  - Unit 2: Lessons 10 18 Determinants & Vector Spaces
  - Unit 3: Lessons 19 27 Eigenvectors & Orthogonal Sets
- Lecture notes outlines: Students can download and print them out from each unit page in Canvas. Or, you have an option to purchase the printed outlines at Target Copy Center. It is important that students have a hard copy of the lecture notes to follow the lectures more easily when watching the videos.

## 2. ASSESSMENTS

- 2a <u>LEARNING QUIZZES</u>: There are 27 sets of learning quizzes (LQs) given on the lesson material, and there are three attempts for each LQ. Students are expected to work individually on these assignments. The two lowest LQ grades will be dropped at the end of the semester.
- 2b <u>MYLAB HOMEWORK:</u> Each online MyLab assignment is a set of problems assigned on MyLab and numbered according to the lesson covered. MyLab assignments provide necessary practice for mastering the material delivered in lecture. Students have <u>five attempts</u> for most questions (except for multiple-choice or true-false questions) in MyLab assignments before the due date. There will be a total of 27 sets of assignments assigned and the two lowest scores will be dropped at the end of the semester.

<u>NOTE:</u> The due date for HW assignment (including LQ and MyLab) for each lesson is shown in the course calendar.

2c <u>MATLAB ASSIGNMENTS</u>: Four MATLAB assignments and two extra credit assignments will be assigned during the semester. Each assignment must be completed using MATLAB software and submitted on Gradescope by its due date. For more information on the assignments, visit the MATLAB page on Canvas and read the instructions for each assignment.

There are five synchronous MATLAB Zoom sessions scheduled for this semester. The Zoom sessions will be recorded and posted in Canvas for the students who are not able to attend.

While engaging in discussion with instructors or classmates is strongly encouraged, students must independently write their own code, examples, and reports for all MATLAB assignments. These discussions should focus on problem-solving rather than providing or receiving specific instructions on writing the code, examples, or reports. Specifically, the following are <u>NOT</u> allowed:

- Splitting an assignment's work into multiple parts with other students
- Giving or sharing your work with another student
- Copying someone else's work
- Copying work from online resources

Remember that the work submitted must be original and your own. Academic dishonesty will be taken very seriously (see 4a). If you are unsure what constitutes plagiarism, ask the instructor!

2d <u>EXAMS</u>: There will be three unit exams and a **cumulative** final exam (optional) offered during the semester. If a student is satisfied with his grade, then he is not required to take the optional final exam. If a student takes all three unit exams and optional final exam, then the <u>lowest exam grade</u> will be dropped at the end of the semester.

<u>NOTE:</u> Calculators may be useful for some homework problems but are not required for the course. <u>Calculators are not allowed on the exams</u>.

**Important Exam Policies:** MAS3114 requires all students to take online exams through **Honorlock** on the listed dates. Each exam opens for a 12-hour period (from 12:00PM noon to 11:59PM) on the exam date, and we recommend starting your test no later than 10:30PM since all exams are closed at midnight. Students with conflicts, including scheduled working hours or traveling, must make advance arrangements to take the exam at the scheduled time.

UF will rely on a Test-In-Place plan for online proctored exams. Each student is expected to use their place of residence whether on or off campus for scheduled online exams. To successfully complete an online proctored exam, students need a quiet space with adequate lighting, no distractions, and a strong and steady internet connection.

#### The following applies to all exams:

- (1) Students are responsible for material covered in lectures and assignments.
- (2) Prior to test start, you will need the following:
  - working external web camera\* and microphone
  - stable internet connection
  - Google Chrome browser and Honorlock Chrome extension

\* It's required to use an external camera to obtain a side-angle view for all Honorlock proctored exams. You can use your phone as an external camera by downloading Camo or EpocCam App. Please see more details on the Honorlock Instructions page in Canvas.

It's recommended that you take the Honorlock Practice on Canvas before Exam 1, so you are familiar with the setup. The side-angle view for the camera, on your left or right side, should capture the profile of your face, both hands, workspace, computer screen, and keyboard. This may require placing the camera on a surface other than your desk, such as a nearby table. Ensure your camera is securely positioned using a tripod or other support to prevent movement during the exam.

- (3) Bring only the following while taking an online exam with Honorlock: Government issued photo ID (or Student Gator One ID) with a legible signature and blank scratch paper (up to 10 sheets).
- (4) Students are required to show the front and back of each scratch paper before starting the first math question on the exam. A room scan is <u>not</u> required.
- (5) The following items/actions are not permitted:
  - No writing visible on desk or on walls. Make sure music/televisions are not playing in the background.
  - Only blank loose-leaf scratch paper (no notepad) is allowed.
  - No websites other than Canvas and the Honorlock proctoring extension should be used or open while taking a proctored exam.
  - Close all other programs and/or windows on the testing computer prior to logging into the proctored test environment.
  - Communication or receiving assistance from others is not permitted during a proctored assessment.
  - Using a phone or any other electronic device, other than your testtaking device, is not permitted. Headphones or smart watches are not permitted.
  - Remain visible in the web camera during the entire duration of the exam.
  - Leaving the room during the testing period is not permitted.
  - Dual monitors are not permitted.

<u>NOTE:</u> If a student is suspected of academic misconduct during an exam, the incident will be reported to the DSO. If the student is found to be responsible for an Honor Code violation, the grade for the exam will be zero. Additionally,

- The zero grade (for Exams 1, 2, or 3) <u>cannot</u> be replaced with the final exam grade.
- A one-letter grade deduction will be applied to the final grade if the zero grade is assigned to the Optional Final Exam due to a violation.

**Exam Grades:** All MAS3114 exam grades will be released within 3 days after each scheduled exam. Students can view exam questions and answers during office hours within one week of releasing grades.

- 2e <u>MAKE-UP POLICIES</u>: We <u>do not</u> consider traveling or lack of internet access as a valid excuse for makeup. Students must provide documentation for makeup and all makeup work must be approved by Dr. Huang.
  - Make-up Exams: If a student is missing an exam due to a legitimate reason (being sick, being away on the UF business, family emergency, or religious holidays), he may provide documentation and request to take early makeup. To be eligible for an early makeup exam, he must send a request to Dr. Huang prior to the exam, and early makeup will be scheduled in the following week if the request is approved. A late request will not be accepted, but students may take the optional makeup exam at the end of the semester.

**UF Exam Policies:** No student is required to take more than three exams in one day. Do not ask for a make-up exam when you have three or less exams on the same day.

 LQs, MyLab and MATLAB Assignments: There is no makeup. If a student has documented illness or other extenuating circumstances, he must contact Dr. Huang prior to the deadline and request an extension.

Late submissions: Due Date is not the Do Date! DO NOT wait to start the assignments on the day that they are due. Note that LQs, MyLab and MATLAB assignments can be submitted late with <u>a 1-point penalty for each hour beyond the due date</u>.

**Warning:** Students should carefully consider and use their judgement to determine whether it is worth submitting an assignment late. Consider the scenarios below:

Scenario 1: Student A scores 90% on a MyLab assignment before the deadline. If he submits the final question (10 points) after 24 hours, his grade will <u>decrease</u> to 76 points in the Canvas gradebook (90 --> 76).

Scenario 2: Student B scores 50% on a MyLab assignment before the deadline. If he submits the remaining question (50 points) after 24 hours, his grade will <u>increase</u> to 76 points in the Canvas gradebook (50 --> 76).

**Assignments Review:** Students can always review their assignments after submission. <u>After the deadline</u>, students should only click "review" when reviewing the assignments and the grade is subject to the late penalty when clicking "submit".

 Extra Credit Assignments

Course Orientation Quiz, Practice Exams, and Discussion Board Participations: no makeup or extension on any extra credit assignments

**3a** <u>COURSE GRADE:</u> The course grade is assigned based on the students' performance on the following weighted categories:

There is a built-in curve in the grading scheme and there will be no additional curve or rounding considered at the end of the semester. Extra assignments for individual students to improve their grades are NOT possible.

**Extra Credit:** The calculation is <u>not</u> correct in Canvas when there are still missing grades during the semester, and it will be accurate at the end of the semester when all grades are posted.

- 3b <u>ONE WEEK POLICY:</u> All grades are posted in the Canvas gradebook. Students are responsible for verifying that those grades are accurate. Students have <u>one week</u> after a score has been posted to contact the instructor if there is a grading or recording issue. Any grade concerns must be communicated through Canvas Mails for security and privacy reasons. We will not consider any grading disputes nor make any grades adjustment at the end of the semester.
- 3c INCOMPLETE: A student who has completed a major portion of the course with a passing grade but is unable to complete the last exam or other course requirements due to illness or emergency may be granted an incomplete, indicated by a grade of "I". This allows the student to complete the course within the first six weeks of the following semester. The student must contact the course coordinator to sign the incomplete grade contract, and must provide documentation of the extenuating circumstances preventing him or her from taking the final exam. The grade of "I" is never used to avoid an undesirable grade and does not allow a student to redo work already graded or to retake the course. See the official incomplete grade policy for details.

4a <u>ACADEMIC HONESTY</u>: University of Florida students are bound by the Honor Pledge.
