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Course Description

A large variety of problems in science, engineering and mathematics can be formulated in the language of differential equations. MAP2302 gives fundamental knowledge required for understanding and solving differential equations and their applications.

The course text is *Elementary Differential Equations* by William F. Trench. This is an open access textbook that is freely available for download at the provided hyperlink. Worked solutions to select problems are available in this link, the link can also be found in the textbook.

A printed version of the textbook (chapters 1, 2, 5, 7 & 10) will be made available for purchase at Target Copy on University Avenue (available 13th May). It is not required for anyone to own a printed version of the text, however it is available for a modest price for those who do want it.

Course Breakdown

There will be 3 exams worth 24 points each, 3 in class quizzes worth 9 points each, and a guaranteed 1 point to make the numbers all integers. I will give plenty of suggested homework problems as a way to prepare for the quizzes and exams but **there is no required homework.** However, if you do the suggested homework, then you may turn them all in at the end of the semester for 1 bonus point.

Make-ups and Grade Disputes
