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This is the first semester of the Mathematics Department's undergraduate level course in abstract algebra. The text is the 8th edition of James Gallian's Abstract Algebra, and we will try to cover the first 15 chapters: group theory and an introduction to ring theory. This is an ambitious project and we will have to move fairly rapidly.

MAS 4105 (Linear Algebra) is required. The student should be adept at reading and riting proofs.

The course grade will be based on weekly homework assignments, and 3 midterm exams. homework will be graded for (a) completeness and (b) correctness of selected problems. each exam will count for $25 \%$ of the grade, and the total of the homework for the remaining $25 \%$. When the final percentages have been computed, letter grades will be assigned as follows: A, $90-100 \%$; B, $80-89 \%$; C, $70-79 \%$; D, $60-69 \%$; E $59 \%$ or under. Plus grades will be given to students within a point or two of a grade boundary. I do not normally assign minus grades. The exact grading scale may be adjusted after the second exam.

Exam dates and the due dates for homework will be announced later.

The student should be familiar with the University's Academic Honesty Policies
Attendance will not be taken, but it is the student's responsibility to attend classes, and to get notes for the lectures if a class must be missed. This policy is consistent with university regulations on attendance.

Makeups for exams must arranged in advance, except in the case of a documented medical emergency.
