Course Objectives	We will cover topics related to matchings, graph colorings, partial orders, block designs, error correcting codes and special topics with time permitting.				
Homework	We will have roughly weekly homework. One problem on each assignment will be a 'Perfect Proof', requiring a perfect solution and allowing multiple revisions.
