Course description:

This course is an introduction to the formal language of mathematics. The goal is to learn how to read, understand and write your own rigorous and precise mathematical arguments. You may be familiar with most of the factual content discussed in the examples, but the novelty is the mathematical rigor and the skill of formal writing.

Prerequisites:

Any 2000+ level UF math course with a minimum grade of C.

Grading:

There will be four in-class midterms, each worth 20%, the remaining 20% will be based on quizzes and participation. There will be no make-up exams or make-up quizzes, however the lowest two quizzes will be dropped, and a replacement for any one missed midterm can be taken at the time scheduled for the final. The letter grade is determined according to a straight scale (93–100 A, 90–92 A-, 87–89 B+, 83–86 B, 80–82 B-, 77–79 C+, 73–76 C, 70–72 C-, 67–69 D+, 63–66 D, 60–62 D-, 0–59 E).

Further course policies:

Closed-book policy: The use of notes or books will not be allowed during midterms/quizzes.

Grading disputes: Any issues or questions about the grading of exams must be brought to the instructor's attention within one week after the exams are returned to the class.

Excused absences: In certain extraordinary circumstances a student will be able to make up a missed exam.
