Course overview

MAC2311 is an introduction to calculus. The topic we will cover include limits, differentiation, applications of the derivative, and integration.

Course components

Text. Calculus, Early Transcendentals Second Edition, by Jon Rogawski, W. H. Freeman and Company (Note: an electronic version of the book is included with the purchase of WebAssign access.)

WebAssign. A WebAssign access code can be purchased from local bookstores or online at www.webassign.net/ufl/login.html. Web-Assign will start enrollment on August 24 and you have a two week grace period to use WebAssign before your must pay for access. Details will be provided in class and on the MAC 2311 e-Learning homepage.

Online homework assignments will be posted 13 times during the semester and must be completed by the specified due date. The homework problems are graded by WebAssign and you will be able to see your score immediately after submitting your work. You will have multiple attempts for each problem; there are aids and a link to the ebook to help you solve each question. Do not try to complete an assignment in one sitting; start early instead of waiting until the due date to avoid missing the deadline.

Exams. There will be four exams during the course of the semester. There will also be a comprehensive final exam, the grade of which can be substituted for your lowest exam score. The tentative dates for the exams are as follows:
