**Prerequisites: Grade C or better in MAC 2313, MAC 2512 or MAC 3473**

## Description and Goals

This course covers the basic theory of ordinary differential equations and initial value problems. It opens with a treatment of first order equations in their various forms and continues with higher-order constant-coefficient linear equations; it also includes an account of Laplace transform methods. Throughout, the theory is illustrated by applications to biology and mechanics.

## Homework/Textbook

Homework will be regularly assigned. Pop quizzes will be given and all the problems in the quizzes will be very close to homework problems.

The textbook we shall use is Fundamentals of Differential Equations and Boundary Value Problems, 7th Edition,

by R. Kent Nagle, Edward B. Saff and Arthur David Snider.

**Final Grades: There will be three mid-term exams ( 20% each), one final exam (30%) and many pop quizzes (10%), all based on suggested homework problems.**
